The Programme can be completed in a minimum of 3 years, and a maximum of 'n+2' years, as per UGC Regulations.

d. Faculty & Support Staff Requirement

Support Staff also shall be allocated, as per the guidelines, at ratio of 1:2, i.e. 2 Support staff for the program in addition to the above faculty, for the first 5000 students shall be ensured at all times.

Courses are delivered in a 'self-study' mode with learning material in the form of SLM's, (print form / eBook Form) and Self Assessments being available to the students.

Additionally, Personal Contact Programs (PCP's) in classroom lecture mode at campus and online via recorded lecture / virtual classroom sessions to be provided as per a fixed schedule towards the end of each term.

f. Instruction Media

Program Instruction shall be delivered using Print SLM, eBook/eSLM, as well as a Personal Contact Program that shall be conducted in classroom mode, as well as broadcast using the internet using virtual classroom platform for students unable to attend physically.

F. Online & Offline Availability of Syllabi, Study Materials & Question Bank

1. Syllabus

The syllabus for the courses offered by SDE is made available to the scholars through the official website of SDE. This gives an outline of the course content for specific courses.

2. Course Materials/ Academic Resources

To supplement the learning from text books and other scholarly resources, study materials are provided by SDE which can be availed through website. This is available both in the form of print and e-resources prepared and scrutinized by eminent teachers.

3. Question Bank

In order to make review of learning, question bank having readymade model questions and answers are made available through the web site.

Grievance Redressal Cell

Exclusively for receiving the grievances of SDE students, a grievance redressal cell has been launched with a view to solve the problems faced by students on the same day of the complaint lodged via e-mail. Unification of Exam

To improve quality and credibility, Exam unification has been implemented, a system which implements the conduct of a single exam for both regular and SDE students.

Choice Based Credit Semester System (CCSS) & CUCBCSS

SDE introduced CCSS for all the UG programmes to improve the curricular standards. This was a milestone towards social justice through education. The modified regulations of Choice based Credit Semester system has been implemented with effect from 2014 admission onwards for all UG Programmes.

Online & Spot Admission, Registration & e-payment Facility

To ensure functional efficiency, Online & Spot certificate verification and admission to UG programmes, Online & Spot certificate verification, admission and distribution of study materials to PG programmes is being facilitated by SDE.

Information Dissemination- Hand Book, Academic Calendar, Website

Hand Book - provides General information about the institution, Courses and facilities offered, Overview of the various UG, PG, Professional/job-oriented and Certificate courses, Admission procedures & Re- admission, Academic Instructions, Rules and regulations and details of University Examinations & Fee structure.

Academic Calendar - SDE introduced a permanent academic calendar for its courses which ensures systematic performance and time bound completion of courses.

Website - The main form of information Dissemination which include Notifications & Information, Online Registration & ID Card, Contact Class schedule, Syllabus, Study Materials and Question Bank.

Library Facility

A library exclusively for reference purposes of the SDE students is facilitated. Reference service of the Calicut University Central Library (C.H. Mohammed Koya Library) in the Campus and Service of Library at the University Study Centers are also offered.

SDE Fest. and Sports meet

A remarkable decision, first of its kind in the History of Indian Universities, to conduct Arts and Sports Festival for the students of School of Distance Education from 2013.

Course with work with worker program

Industry Centered Skill Empowered Programme (SDEICSEP) under the title "Work with Worker". The Major Objective of this program is to extend certified skills to those who are not getting formal entry to the Higher Education. Also the aim is to create sustainable programs for training and retraining of youth for employability or entrepreneurship including vocational skilling, Job placement and the creation of enterprises.

Little Professor Program

'Little Professor' education programme is a novel program of Calicut University and will be the first University in the state to offer this. This will allow academically brilliant, versatile, genius to enroll in degree programmes of the University. The 'Little Professor' programme will not have any basic qualifications such as plus two for admission to degree courses of the University. This was well appreciated by the academic and public. The applicants will be screened by their performance in an entrance test. 80% marks will be the cut off. The enrolled students have to score 80% in their first year exam for further promotion.

G. Requirement of the laboratory support and Library Resources

Regarding Sanskrit language study, laboratory hours is not mandatory. But students can avail the computers from SDE study centre where continuous internet connectivity is available. Library Facilities

SDE has its own library facility with a total of about 3852 books, 1165 titles, 144 reference titles. Further, all the students of the School of Distance Education can make use of the reference service of the Calicut University Central Library (C.H. Mohammed Koya Library) in the Campus. Graduates of the Calicut University are eligible to get membership of the Central Library. They can also make use of the Library at the University Study Centre located at P.T. Usha Road, Calicut. Students registered in this Directorate and who desire to avail themselves of library facilities will be permitted to make use of the University Library.

Quality assurance mechanism and expected programme outcomes:

Government oversight of higher education institutions (HEIs) is an important function in nearly every country around the world. This is driven by a need to establish that a tertiary degree will have value to the student and to the broader society. Because the government typically is the primary funder of higher education, there is an interest in verifying that education has both fitness for purpose (how well education fulfils its objectives) and fitness of purpose (the relevance of higher education to societal needs). The pursuit of a tertiary degree entails a significant investment of time and or money on the part of the student, often at a pivotal time in that student's life. Pursuing a degree from a low quality or unrecognized institution can result in a wasting of that investment and it is

Minimum Eligibility and Fee structure for B.A Sanskrit Programme:

Candidates who have passed (Eligible for Higher Studies) the HSE of the Kerala State Board of Higher Secondary Examination or any other examination recognized as equivalent thereto are eligible for admission.

Fee structure:

1. Registration fee (Admission fee): : 1200/-
2. Course fee (Tuition fee) for one year (2 semesters) : 1400/-
3. Matriculation fee (for those who are enrolling in University of Calicut for the 1st time) : 100/-
4. Re-matriculation fee (for those who have migrated from the university of Calicut to other Universities) : 150/-
5. Recognition fee (for those who have qualified from board/Universities of other states) : 100/-
6. Postage charges (for those who are not availing the facility of Spot admission) : 50/-
7. Spot admission fee (for those who are availing the spot admission facility) : 50/-

(Tuition fee for 1st year (2 semesters) should be remitted along with the application fee at the time of registration itself. Tuition fee for 2nd and 3rd years should be remitted after the completion of 2nd and 4th semester examinations respectively. Candidates belonging to SC/ST/OEC are eligible for concession from payment of Tuition Fee, only if they are not employed in Govt./Quasi Govt./Public Sector Services. They should submit the duly filled in application form (available in the

very difficult for the student to redo their educational experience. Yet, because of information asymmetry (i.e., the HEI knows much more about the quality of the educational experience than the student), it is difficult for the student (or others) to be able to effectively evaluate the quality of the HEI. Therefore, the government, as the authorizer of the institution, serves as a guarantor of a minimum level of educational quality

and the assurance that the degree would be recognized as a valid credential in that country.

Almost all HEIs in countries are legally required to obtain some sort of authorization from a government entity to operate and award recognized degrees. And, this process of authorization is often separate from, though in some case parallel to, quality assurance efforts (which are described below). Public institutions, by their very nature, receive such authorization directly from the government through a public charter or inclusion in statute. They often remain under some form of control of the government, with governing board members or other leadership appointed by government officials and faculty and staff treated as government employees.

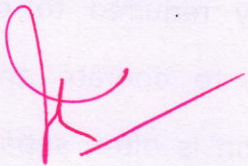
Learner Support Centre

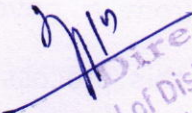

The success of these centres often depends on community participation, the hiring and training of quality staff, the provision of technology to help people learn, and the collection and analysis of data that can be used to guide the operation and marketing of the centre. are often scarce, learning centres may also enable the public to access information and communication technologies.
