The DDFS has facilitated quick processing of files, faster decision making, real time tracking and status verification. Using this facility employees and administrators can also work from homes and off-campus locations.

Students Admission: The Directorate of Admissions (DoA) established with a view to stream line the entire admissions process in the University Teaching Departments and affiliated colleges of the University. The main aim of DoA is to conduct centralised admissions to various UG, PG, M.Phil & Ph.D programmes offered by the University and its affiliated colleges in a systematic, transparent and student friendly manner following all reservation rules. The major task of DoA is Centralised Admission Process (CAP) for UG and PG, which offers facility for online submission of single application for various UG & PG courses in multiple colleges affiliated to the University. CAP helps students to submit applications of their choice through simple online steps. This hassle free process is time saving, cost effective and ensures transparency in admission.

<u>Examination Procedure</u>: Introduced e-payment system through online as well as filling the application, download hall ticket, marklist, etc.

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

#### 6.3.1 Curriculum Development

- Workshops on software and data handling, seminars on contemporary issues and
  power point presentations apart from class room lecturer are organized Wi-Fi
  network is also made available to students and teachers. The University
  encourages blended learning by using e-learning resources. The computer aided
  learning is given priority.
- The wi-fi internet and cabled internet access is available in all the departments, library and hostels to enhance the scope of e-learning. Also University conducts periodic training programmes on adopting new technologies of ICT to better equip the faculty to have computer and internet access. All the University departments have digital class rooms.

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#### 6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

Workshops on software and data handling, seminars on contemporary issues and power point presentations apart from class room lecturer are organised Wi-Fi network is also made available to students and teachers. Enrichment with e-content, innovative methods of teaching. Classroom teaching includes ICT based teaching. Students are offered assignment seminars and general seminars to improve the presentation and communication skill. Minor and Major projects are offered respectively in 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> semesters. The lab experiments offered in first and second semesters are capable for inducing research attitude in students. All the experiments have both synthesis, characterization and analysis part and each student is getting opportunity to use all sophisticated analytical tools available in the departments. Films, documentaries and other online resources are widely used for the teaching of concepts, when students were found to be fascinated and interested in them.

#### 6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

External examinations of M.Sc. course has double valuation scheme. Answer scripts of internal examinations (2 per paper) are returned to the student to ensure complete transparency of the evaluation system. Viva voce examination held for each lab course in addition to practical examinations (2 each) and scientific record keeping with respect to each examination. Continuous assessment and end semester assessment is conducted as per the CCSS norms. The evaluation scheme for each paper shall contain two parts as Internal Evaluation and External Evaluation. 40% weight shall be given to the internal evaluation. The remaining 60% weight shall be for the end semester external evaluation. Internal evaluations are conducted transparently through interactive discussions, seminars, tutorials, assignments regularly.

# 6.3.4 Research and Development

Selection of research scholars through entrance examination conducted by the University and permitting direct entry to candidates having UGC, CSIR Fellowships. Apart from improving research facilities by procuring more equipment, faculty and research scholars are involved in research activities in frontier areas in association with national and international centres of excellence. Timely relevant, locally applicable topics are selected by MA, M.Sc., M.Com, M.LiSc., MBA, M.PEd, M.Ed., M.Phil and Ph.D. students for their dissertations and theses. Major findings are published in national and international journals of depute. One of the alumni got Fullbright scholarship in the year 2015.

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Library: C.H. Mohammed Koya Library of the University plays a vital role in the academic activities of the University of Calicut by providing all kinds of information resources, print as well as digital to cater to the information needs of the academic community. It also offers extension services like seminars, workshops, trainings etc. CHMK Library has set up an exclusive Digital Library with 50 computers specifically set apart for accessing e-books, e-journals and e-Theses etc., while all the digital contents are made available over the entire campus through wired network and wifi connectivity. It makes use of only open source software for its house keeping operations and library services, digital library, digital repository, website etc. The library offers regular orientation programs and trainings in the use of digital resources. In-house as well as outside - internal and external experts from various information providers are also utilized for this purpose. Every new student admitted to the University department/centre in the campus receives this orientation while students and teacher groups from outside are also given such trainings on demand. The digital collection of e-books, e-journals, e-theses etc. are very huge and the library has digitized a good amount of its Theses and are available through the national repository called "Shodhganga" hosted by INFLIBNET Centre of UGC. The library has a balanced collection of print documents consisting of almost all subject areas and different types of resources are available as listed below:

CSIF has purchased a wide range of sophisticated equipment to cater the need of all teaching departments.

Centre for Women's Studies of the University has close interaction with the State Social Justice Dept., the State Women's Commission, the KILA and the LSGIs. Faculties often serve as Resource Persons for the seminars/workshops organised by all these entities. The Dept. serves as the nodal centre to coordinate and monitor the activities of Women Development Cells functioning in all affiliated colleges of the University. Thus there is a strong interaction and collaboration with all the colleges.

6.9 What efforts are made by the University/ Autonomous College for Examination Reforms?

We have been able to streamline the functioning of the system including examinations through an effective co-ordination of activities of the participating departments. The overlapping of semesters and the lagging of programmes have become a thing of the past. This major reform was implemented after many discussions and deliberations by the entire academic community of the campus. Certainly this initiative has proved to be a big success. It is remarkable that the Pareeksha Bhavan has adapted so nicely to the reform and facilitated online registration for end-semester examinations, delivery of hall tickets to the Departments online and the publication of results. The smooth conduct of the examinations and publication of final results instill a lot of confidence in the minds of students and teachers about the reform.

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6.10 What efforts are made by the University to promote autonomy in the affiliated/constituent colleges?

Granting autonomy is a subject of the UGC and the colleges concerned. College Development Council of the University give directions to all its affiliated colleges which come under the purview of 2(f) and 12(b) list of the UGC Act 1956, to come forward and apply for autonomy, with their credentials and offer whole hearted support to the colleges thus reported. During the reporting period 7 major colleges were granted autonomy status by UGC.

6.11 Activities and support from the Alumni Association

Alumni association conducts academic and socieconomic programs independently and in collaboration with concerned departments. Departments also have separate alumni association that organizes programmes for the students of the department.

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#### Energy conservation:

Use of renewable energy: Efforts have been undertaken to use solar energy in the campus and thereby to reduce conventional power consumption, which would help in overcoming power crisis. Solar energy is presently utilized for street lights and office purposes. Details of installations made in this direction are given below. Solar street lights: 57 Nos. (30 Watts) are installed in the campus. Solar powerhouse: 6 modules (25KW each) are installed in the campus (2 Nos. in Ladies Hostel, 1 No. in Men's Hostel, 1 in Administration Block, 1 in Library and 1 in Digital Wing) and are functioning.

Biogas plant: Two 30 cubicmetre Digister Volume Fixed Dome-shaped Biogas plants, each with an installation cost of Rs. 5.5 lakhs are proposed in Ladies

Hostel, one each in New and Old Blocks.

#### Water Conservation:

Water harvesting: Extensive rain water harvesting projects have been implemented in the last five years. Three 20x20x6 m3 water conservation ponds were constructed at different locations of the campus. One large water conservation pond of size 50x50x6 m<sup>3</sup> was constructed in the Botanical Garden for rain water harvesting. It holds water for about three feet depth even during extreme summer months. It is a main source of water for the Botanical Garden and University Park.

Moisture Conservation Pits: Constructed 3000 moisture conservation pits of 1x-1x1 m<sup>3</sup> size to conserve rain water and to recharge Ground Water at different locations

of the Campus.

Check dam construction: Constructed 5 structures of size ranging from 3x 3x2 in 3 to 11.5 x 7 x 2 m in the campus to harvest rain water and reduce soil erosion is a list

#### Efforts for Carbon neutrality:

Implementation of E governance: Implementation of e-governance in the University is one among the novel means to promote carbon neutrality. E-governance implemented through DDFS considerably reduced the use of paper and other office stationery in the University. Emailing and web posting of hand outs are also promoted both in the administrative and academic sectors.

Introduction of non-polluting vehicles For the maintenance of a smoke free campus, bicycles were issued to the students free of cost. The stakeholders were mainly hostel dwellers of the campus.

Restriction on plastic and other polymeric materials for advertisements: Use of rexine/plastic or allied materials are restricted in the campus for the printing of banners/posters etc.

Green planting/carbon offset planting: Excessive planting of biodiverse mix tree species has been practiced in the campus for enhancing its environmental quality.

#### **Plant Diversity Conservation:**

Calicut University Botanical Garden:

Established in 1971 in the lush green panoramic, undulating, lateritic hummodky land of the Calicut University Campus, the Calicut University Botanical Garden (CUBG), has developed into an excellent centre of biodiversity and ex situ conservation of tropical Indian flora and exotic species.

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#### Hazardous waste management:
